## INTRODUCTION

The Independent Asylum Commission – in association with the CITIZEN Organising Foundation – between October 2006 and July 2008, conducted the most comprehensive review of the UK asylum system ever undertaken. The twelve Commissioners, chaired by Sir John Waite and Ifath Nawaz, spent eighteen months listening to evidence from all sides of the debate and all parts of the country, through public hearings, expert witnesses, individual testimony, an opinion poll, focus groups, People's Commissions and interviews. They have published recommendations that they believe will safeguard people who seek sanctuary here, but also restore public support for sanctuary among the British people.

The Independent Asylum Commission's work is complete – now the CITIZENS for Sanctuary campaign begins the work of transforming the recommendations into reality.

This booklet has been produced by the Independent Asylum Commission and the CITIZENS for Sanctuary campaign to help ordinary citizens, leaders of CITIZEN member organisations and community groups, and all people of goodwill, to begin the transformation of how we treat people seeking sanctuary. The booklet identifies ten of the Independent Asylum Commission's key findings and proposed solutions, and suggests actions for individuals and groups at a local and national level.

We hope that this inspires you to act, and "be the change you want to see in the world."


No-one will be able to do every single action, but feel free to pick and choose ideas, and even think of your own.



CAN I DO? your friends the link to the UN's online game 'Against All Odds' and find out with them what it is like for those who flee persecution.

CAN I DO? your local newspaper editor to update their style guide to include terms such as sanctuary.

CAN 1 DO? Read the book 'Bloody Foreigners' by Robert Winder to find examples of some of the contributions that refugees have made to the UK over the centuries.

A CAN I DO? Encourage your church, mosque or school to hold an event celebrating the contribution of refugees to the UK - or even to your community.

Celebrate the enormous contribution that refugees have made to the UK.

CAN I DO? your local chip shop if they will support Refugee Week by displaying a poster or leaflet explaining how fish and chips was brought to the UK by refugees.



CAN I DO? businesses. voluntary and other organisations to set up volunteer internships for people seeking sanctuary to help them and the communities in which they live.


Provide people seeking sanctuary with support to increase their skills and prepare them for work in the UK or back home.




